# **International Students' Day:** Mokuolu calls for issuance of student visas

former Director of the Centre for International Education (CIE), University of Ilorin, Prof. Olugbenga Mokuolu, has urged the Federal Government to consider issuing student visas to attract international students from outside the ECOWAS region. Delivering a keynote address at the 11th edition of the International Students' Day organised by CIE at the University Auditorium last Thursday (June 13, 2024), Prof. Mokuolu noted the cumbersome nature of Residency Permits and argued that student visas would be more efficient.

The management of the University of Ilorin has taken proactive steps to reduce energy consumption on campus to mitigate the financial impact of rising electricity tariffs on its budget.



This was contained in an internal memorandum to members of the University Community last Monday (June 10, 2024).

The memo cited recent increases in electricity bills from the Ibadan Electricity Distribution Company (IBEDC) as a key factor driving the need for this change of attitude.

# Olorundare seeks TETFUND, others' intervention to stem 'darkness in varsities'

Professor of Pharmacology at the University of Ilorin, Olufunke Esan Olorundare, has stressed the need for Vice Chancellors in Nigerian universities to come together to strategise on how to seek the intervention of the Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFUND, corporate organisations, philanthropists and state governments in stemming the current epileptic electricity power situation especially as it affects the universities.

Prof. Olorundare, who made this call last Thursday (June 13, 2024) while delivering the 260th Inaugural Lecture of the University, titled "In Sickness and Good Health: Pharmacology as Systems Medicine Research Primer", said this "situation of darkness in the universities" is unacceptable. *(Contd. on page 3)*

# Mokuolu calls for issuance of student visas

He commended the Minister of Interior, Olubunmi Tunji-Ojo, for recent reforms but urged further action to facilitate student visa issuance.

Prof. Mokuolu, a renowned scholar of Paediatrics & Child Health, also presented a vision for transforming education and fostering global engagement. He emphasised the importance of creating seamless pathways for international students.

The former CIE Director recommended the establishment of dedicated funding for international initiatives within the university. He also suggested actively seeking external funding without affecting core operations, adding that the approach would enable investment in innovative programmes, scholarships, and exchange opportunities.

Prof. Mokuolu said, "Internationalisation is not an option; it's a requirement". He called for intentionality, resource commitment, and an enabling environment at both national and institutional levels.

Also speaking at the event, the Governor of Kwara State, Mallam AbdulRahman AbdulRazaq, CON, commended the University's achievements in excellence and urged continued progress towards developing society.

# **Olorundare seeks TETFUND, others' intervention to stem 'darkness in varsities'**

The Inaugural Lecturer, who pointed out that electricity should be improved generally in the country, said that "there is an urgent need to invest in solar-generated power supply in all Federal and State universities, adding that "the logistics of getting this done can be worked out such that within the next five years all these universities will be lit up".

Prof. Olorundare also called on TETFUND to "devote attention to funding the purchase and maintenance of equipment for laboratories in our various universities for basic science teaching and research at the undergraduate level.

She said that although "TETFUND has done marvelously in the area of providing buildings for most of our tertiary institutions, the time has come for TETFUND to prioritise providing funds to equip these magnificent empty buildings to make our universities real universities".

The Inaugural Lecturer further charged TETFUND to "insist on obtaining major equipment directly from the overseas manufacturers, who must not only install the equipment and make sure that they function at the delivery stage, but also enter into maintenance agreements with these companies for the equipment".

She lamented the situation whereby middlemen and contractors who know very little about the functioning of the equipment they supplied are saddled with the task, adding that some of these contractors even supply equipment that will never be put to use beyond a few

weeks or months.

Describing this situation as "a deplorable waste of government resources", Prof. Olorundare said it is also "deeply frustrating for researchers".

The don also called on the Federal Ministry of Health, the National Agency for Food and Drugs Administration and Control, (NAFDAC), and TETFUND to take a cue from the People's Republic of China in embarking on systematic and organised search for African plants and herbs products derived from bioresources including plants, which can be developed further for commercial purposes and non commercial benefits of the society, an endeavour known as Bioprospecting.

It urged students, Faculty, and staff members to embrace simple yet effective actions such as switching off lights, computers, and other appliances when not in use, utilisng energy-efficient light bulbs, and avoiding unnecessary use of electrical devices. In addition to individual

responsibility, the memorandum required all departments and units within the University to actively participate in energy conservation efforts, which

include implementing specific energysaving measures and identifying areas where further improvements can be made.

As a more specific step, the University has established a new electricity schedule. This schedule outlines specific on and off-peak hours for electricity supply to the Main Campus Staff Quarters, the GRA Staff Quarters, and the Hostels:

The management also charged the Works Department and the Security Unit with enforcing this schedule and ensuring that street and security lights are switched on at 6.30p.m. and switched off at 6.00 a.m. every day.

Additionally, hostel managers, hostel owners, and the Student Affairs Unit are responsible for communicating and enforcing these guidelines within the student housing areas.

The University emphasised the importance of collaboration and cooperation from all stakeholders to successfully reduce its energy footprint and manage the financial burden associated with the rising electricity costs.

# There's more to Eid-ul Adhā than just feasting-- Unilorin Chief Imam

he Chief Imam of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Nasir AbdusSalam, has affirmed that there is more to learn about Eid-ulAdha (or Eid-el Kabir) apart from being a sacrificial festival.

He said this during a pre-Sallah interview session on *Unilorin 89. 3 FM* last Tuesday (June 11, 2024, featured on a popular Yoruba current affairs programme, 'Oro t'on lo' anchored by the Station Manager, Mr Idris Alooma.

Prof. AbdusSalam, who is the Director of the Central Research Laboratory, said that it is pertinent to prepare for Eid-ulAdha, understand its significance and ensure to engage in acts of worship to deepen one's spiritual connection with Allah.

The don stated that EidulAdha, also known as the Festival of Sacrifice, is an important Islamic festival that commemorates the willingness of Prophet Ibrahim to sacrifice his only son as an act of obedience to Allah. It signifies total submission and display of high sense of humility by Ismail. It also marks the end of the annual Hajj pilgrimage in Mecca, Saudi Arabia.

According to the Chief Imam, the festival encourages Muslims to imbibe the values of sacrifice in their daily lives, sacrificing their personal

desires and possessions for the sake of pleasing Allah and benefiting mankind.

He noted that preparation for Eid-ulAdha involves several religious and social practices among which is fasting on the day of Arafah, which is the day preceding the festival.

Prof. AbdusSalam noted that "Eid-ulAdha begins before the actual day when the faithful march to the Praying Ground and it is recommended to fast on the Day of Arafah (the day before Eid-ul Adha) if you are not on pilgrimage and not sick. It is a day that holds great significance and blessing and every Muslim who is not chanced to perform Hajj, is enjoyed to observe the Arafah fast".

He explained that one of the things that makes Eid-ulAdha an exciting celebration is that it involves the sharing of meat. He said, "Those who are fortunate enough to purchase an animal are expected to slaughter it after the prayer. The meat from the animal is then shared according to the prophetic tradition, with one-third reserved for the family, one-third for relatives and friends, and one-third for the needy and those who could not afford to purchase an animal. This tradition aims to ensure that everyone can partake in the celebration and no one feels left out".

The Chief Imam, who is also a former Director of the General Studies Division (GNS), said that the sacrificial animal must be in a good state of health without any form of disabilities such as blindness of the eyes, leanness of the legs and visible sickness, among others.

Prof. AbdusSalam admonished the Muslim Ummah to "continue with their righteous acts even after the festive period", saying that "the Lord that rewards during the period has no tenure expiration and shall continue to reward our good deeds accordingly".

She said that Bioprospecting of African medicinal plants and herbs has to be made a pivotal agenda in Nigerian Universities, at TETFUND at NAFDAC and at the Federal Ministry of Health for the welfare of Nigerians as well as for economic purposes.

Prof Olorundare noted that in the course of a TETFUND sponsored research, her team, in collaboration with Prof. Mamora Koketsu of Gifu University, Gifu, Japan, made groundbreaking findings in 2014.

According to her, the team identified anti-cancer agents in different indigenous plants such as the masquerade tree, which possess anticancer potency and particularly useful in the management of Human Leukemia. In addition, she said, the team also discovered a compound, which they named Ilonside, after Ilorin, in an indigenous vegetable spice, Benth, known as urazi in the East, Arokeke or Eweta in the South West, and Obenetete in the South-South.

Further Bioprospecting researches involving indigenous plants by the don also offer bright promises for prostate cancer and cardiovascular well being.

Prof. Olorundare also urged the management of the University of Ilorin to renew its commitment to stem cell research and biotechnology, noting that the future of medical research is in regenerative medicine, gene editing and gene therapy.

She urged members of the public to note that the benefits of fruits

and vegetables transcend nutritional value.

According to her, "fruits and vegetables are excellent sources of fibres, vitamins and minerals. They are also known to contain several micronutrients and other compounds such as alkaloids, polyphenols, terpenes etc. that provide health benefits beyond basic nutrition." These natural products from fruits and vegetables, according to the Inaugural Lecturer, may be used alone or in combination with conventional chemotherapeutic drug regimens to prevent the occurrence and spread of cancer, through their anticancer, antiinflammatory, immune-modulatory and anti-angiogenic activities.



# Participants and other stakeholders at the training UNILORIN AAKTP trains 100 farmers on AVAC App usage

he University of Ilorin's African Knowledge Transfer Partnership (AAKTP) Project Team has trained over 100 farmers on the utilisation of the Agricultural Value Chain (AVAC)

The AVAC App is a deployment of user acceptance testing of the AVAC MVP from the testing environment to live production environment, to enhance productivity and minimise losses through technology across Kwara State.

The training session, held on Monday, May 27, 2024, at the NLNG Research Building, University of Ilorin, was attended by researchers and rice farmers from different communities across the state.

The initiative is part of an innovative programme developed in collaboration with Innovate UK, aiming to build capacity and transfer knowledge to African farmers through the AVAC App.

In his opening remarks at the training, the Project Academic Supervisor, AAKTP, and a Professor of Biosystem Agriculture at the University, Joshua Olaoye, disclosed that the research team consists of fresh graduates who have been fully employed to ensure the success of the AVAC App.

Prof. Olaoye said that the programme, which began 15 months ago, includes various workshops conducted both locally and internationally with the

primary goal to demonstrate the App's functionality to farmers and ensure its acceptance through user testing.

"The AVAC App offers several features designed to support farmers, including farming activity reminders, a platform to showcase farm produce for sale, and a buyer's order command dashboard", he said.

Also speaking, the project African Academic Supervisor for AAKTP, Prof. M. O. Sumonu, stated that the App and the programme also aim to educate farmers on managing floods, pests, and other hazards to achieve higher yields.

Prof. Sunmonu added that "the App allows farmers to lodge complaints and receive online solutions promptly. Efforts are ongoing to make the App multilingual to enhance user-friendliness".

He said that micro-scale companyembedded programme was officially opened by the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Egbewole, adding that prior to the training, the research team visited various farmlands to observe and address the farmers' needs.

Prof. Sunmonu said, "This initiative represents a significant step towards integrating technology into agriculture to improve efficiency and productivity for local farmers".

Speaking with **UNILORIN BULLETIN**, AAKTP Associate Researcher, Mr Dare Mobolaji, stated that AAKTP aimed at addressing the challenges faced by farmers in the country, adding that the introduction of the AVAC App marks a promising step towards sustainable agricultural development and economic growth for Nigerian farmers.

Mr Mobolaji said, "The initiative targets two major obstacles: the illiteracy in digital marketing systems and the reliance on outdated farming practices. Farmers in Nigeria often struggle to sell their produce due to limited knowledge of digital marketing platforms. Coupled with the use of outdated agricultural methods, this has hindered their productivity and market access.

The AVAC App was designed to bridge the gap by providing farmers with digital and professional advice to enhance their farming practices and market reach.

"The introduction of the AVAC App marks a promising step towards sustainable agricultural development and economic growth for Nigerian farmers", he added.

According to him, the App is built to be 99 percent user-friendly, and ensure ease of use for both farm managers and buyers.

Speaking on behalf of the participating farmers, Mr Hassan Yatsu, a rice farmer, explained that with what has been built into the application, it will be very useful for the farmers as it would aid their farming as well as facilitate the marketing of their products better than ever before. 

Many of Professor Egbewole's other contributions have x-rayed the place of the African court in safeguarding human rights. Through his writings, particularly in relation to human rights, he explored themes relating to the perspective of the African court. This Senior Advocate of Nigeria (SAN) has explained how there are nuances in the position of the people. Among other things, he has always established that, although the African perspective on a legal debate takes a sociocultural dimension, attitudes and attributes have not hindered them from enhancing the legal safety of individuals and protecting their rights.

As such, it is important to note that the progress achieved by African courts contributes to developing a template that has a global appeal for legal matters. This ensures that their jurisprudence will not be ideologically different from what is obtainable in other parts of the world. Professor Egbewole's passion for ensuring that things are done appropriately has always fueled his energy and zeal to become more than he already is in the

scheme of things. This intelligent scholar has facilitated programs aimed at educating the younger members of the bar. He encourages them to gain an understanding of the current situation of the world and continent and draw out legal frameworks that can help position Africa in the right place among other continents. For this accomplished legal professional, while ideas and concepts are increasingly becoming globalized, maintaining ideological boundaries and clarity remains crucial.

Professor Egbewole has contributed immensely to books and journals, earning him a lot of respect, accumulating international support, and confirming that he has inscribed himself into the book of history. Another amazing thing about him is that his intellectual rigour does not end within the legal landscape; it extends to other areas of important academic boundaries. For example, he has made educational contributions addressing labour union issues in the country, geared towards the democratic distribution of power to enhance the effective operation of academic activities and other matters affecting the general populace.

As an example, he stresses that the isolation of the University of Ilorin from active engagement with the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU) is not intended to antagonize the organization. Instead, he acknowledges their significance in advocating for the larger academic community so that staff and students can derive maximum benefits. However, he raises concerns about the strategies and approaches sometimes employed by the association, noting the adverse effects on the students they claim to be representing. As an expert in peace and conflict management, he offers recommendations to address the perennial challenges faced by the Union and the country's educational system. He concludes that without the implementation of lasting solutions to these myriad challenges, they will continue to affect the country's educational system in more ways than can be effectively handled.

entral to social advancement is a vast constellation of ideas that springs from the knowledge of informed individuals. These ideas are not indiscriminately produced; rather, they are accumulated through dedication and a commitment to improving people's ideas and transforming their vision. The satisfactory achievement of these goals often leads to people generating ideas that become the catalyst for unprecedented growth.

It is important to understand that any level of progress made by humans or any tangible outcomes from their actions are a direct result of their unwavering commitment and perseverance to ensure that they accomplish the things they dedicate themselves to. In their minds, they would have carved out routine activities that would enable them to achieve their desires. Often, these activities require discipline,

dedication, and commitment, which are qualities that cannot be externally inspired. This underscores the fact that without a significant amount of discipline and effort, individuals will inevitably encounter difficulties on their paths to achieving any meaningful success in life.

In every profession and career, such dedication and character towards one's goals cannot be found wanting; otherwise, it would be impossible to accomplish anything tangible in the community of humans. Without a doubt, that seems to be the way of nature, as it is a common experience that success requires a solid commitment. For instance, doctors who perform successful surgical operations did not begin their experimentation in the theatre room. Instead, they start their professional trajectory with the minuscule efforts of burning candles to read in secondary school and during their tertiary education. Lawyers, architects, pilots, captains, and other professionals follow the same trajectory. For some academics, they are often measured by their contributions to debates and the formulation of replicable ideas that lead to policy generation. Although a significant portion of our professional engagement is dedicated to teaching and remoulding members of society from the classroom, not many people give the necessary accolades to teachers for taking up this assignment. In fact, many believe that teaching is a natural calling and that everyone involved in the business is owed some recognition or rewards only by the Almighty.

Without straying, there is a connection between Professor Egbewole's professional development and the quality of intellect that always follows his identity. His innumerable contributions to scholarship define him today in the community of intellectuals. I find the legal positions of this erudite scholar particularly intriguing in one of his co-published articles, which considers the legal implications of business and contract agreements made before the breakout of the COVID-19 pandemic. This publication piqued my interest because I am aware of the adverse impacts such agreements can have on existing deals.

I have particularly become more knowledgeable about contractual agreements and the implications of unforeseeable circumstances, such as accidents, medical issues, and pandemics, which can potentially affect someone or people in performing the legal responsibilities that their contracts have outlined. In places

like the United Arab Emirates, civil law ensures that parties involved in contracts receive necessary assistance in cases of force majeure. This legal framework allows them to seek additional compensation in court for unforeseen emergencies, which also enables them to address problems holistically and not in ways that would affect a single party, considering that none of them is responsible for the emerging challenges.

Conversely, countries like Nigeria, the USA, and some others that practice common law do not afford such privileges. It is intriguing to understand that places like Nigeria do not automatically recognize the challenges faced by parties involved in contracts during unforeseen circumstances. However, this is not because they are especially inhuman but because they lack an understanding of the complexity of human interactions. Therefore, they argue that a force majeure clause must be inserted into the contracts before claims can be made.

I am genuinely satisfied when I learn from people like Professor Egbewole because that knowledge has a significant impact on me and other individuals potentially entering into contractual agreements with clients at different places. More importantly, the enlightenment provided by his other publications cannot be overemphasized. For instance, many now understand the crucial role of the judiciary in helping to develop a healthy and representative democracy-thanks to scholars like Professor Egbewole, who have continued to conduct research that sheds light on these things.

While it is common knowledge that the judiciary enforces laws made by the legislature and carried out by the executive, not many of us in other professions understand the significance of the judiciary system across very critical parts of any country, the absence of which could have dire consequences. For example, if the judiciary fails in its responsibilities, it stands a huge chance of sinking the country's economic system. This is because not only are they directly expected to undertake the legal obligations that would enhance orderliness, but they are also expected to play a leadership role in achieving the nation's goals and objectives. Professor Egbewole emphasizes that respecting the rights and freedom of the common people is fundamental to true liberation and economic development, as investors gauge a country's character based on how it treats its citizens, influencing their decisions on whether to invest there or not.
