# **DSS** seeks support to enhance internal security

he Director-General of the Department of State Services (DSS), Mr Oluwatosin Adeola Ajayi, MON, has urged stakeholders in the country's security architecture to collaborate more closely with the Service to identify and train highly dedicated individuals with access to critical information that will enhance internal security.

Mr Ajayi made the appeal last Wednesday (February 12, 2024) while delivering the 2025 Distinguished Personality Lecture of the Centre for Peace and Strategic Studies (CPSS), University of Ilorin. The Lecture, titled "The Role of the DSS in Security, Peacekeeping, and National Integration", was held at the University Auditorium.

he Registrar of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB), Prof. Is-haq Olanrewaju Oloyede, CON, has said that the Board retained 16 years as the minimum age for admission into tertiary institutions in the country to accommodate exceptional candidates who meet all academic requirements

and to ensure that qualified admission seekers do not face unnecessary delays in their academic progression.

Prof. Oloyede made this known last Monday (February 10, 2025) during a visit to the University of Ilorin CBT Registration Centre, where he monitored the ongoing registration of candidates for the 2025 UTME exercise. (Contd. on page 4)

### **Egbewole hails DSS'** performance

Represented by the Assistant Director-General of Intelligence, Mr. Patrick Ikenweiwe, the Director-General stressed the need to sustain the enlistment of talented and committed citizens to help neutralise security threats and support nation-building.

He observed that the current perception of security and intelligence organisations as enemies rather than friends must be addressed, as it affects the quality and quantity of intelligence produced and by extension impacts peace building and national integration.

Speaking on the challenges in DSS intervention efforts, Mr Ajayi said, "There are circumstances where stakeholders exhibit utmost disregard for intelligence estimates, regardless of the implications. The Service also has to contend with legal, human rights and jurisdictional constraints as some of its interventions can inevitably blur the lines of law and rights. Inter-agency rivalry is also a stumbling block for the Service to effectively carry out its onerous task".

To address these challenges, the DSS Director-General called for the strengthening of institutional frameworks, re-orientation on the roles of intelligence agencies, and a review of recruitment and staffing processes. He also urged stakeholders to increase their support for the DSS, particularly in terms of funding and valuing the intelligence outputs provided for

In his welcome address, the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, commended the Department of State Services (DSS) for their significant contributions to national security.

The Senior Advocate of Nigeria, who noted improvements in the security situation in the North-East and North-West regions of the country, attributed the progress to the efforts of the DSS, especially under the leadership of Mr. Oluwatosin Adeola Ajayi as Director-General.

The Vice Chancellor said while the

DSS operates discreetly, it is, however, important for the Service to communicate its achievements to Nigerians, particularly at this time. He said, "With the emergence of Mr Ajayi as DG of the Service, the story has changed positively. It is, therefore, important, as an academic community, to listen to how this has happened, to listen to how it is happening, and to investigate how peace can be better enhanced in the country.

Speaking earlier, the Director of the Centre for Peace and Strategic Studies, Prof. Ibrahim Abdulganiyu Jawondo, fspsp, said

the Centre and the DSS have had longstanding and symbiotic relationship. He pointed out that the Centre regularly admits and graduates DSS personnel and supports the National Institute for Security Studies, Abuja, through affiliation.

Prof. Jawondo said, "I am glad to inform you that our association with the DSS has been long and we have been to ourselves dependable allies. Sir, every year we admit and graduate their men from our Centre. Also, through affiliation, we have continued to service the National Institute for Security Studies, Abuja. ... with this analysis, you would agree with me that the impact of the Centre cuts across human strata in Nigeria and beyond and are indelible".

The CPSS Director, however, said that the Public Lecture was aimed at strengthening the relationship between the DSS and the Centre, while jointly working to formulate new theories and practices in peace education for the general public.

Prof. Jawondo appreciated the Vice Chancellor for the tremendous support the Centre had been receiving since he assumed office, saying that the Centre, from zero professor, now has two full professors, two Associate professors and two new academic staff in addition to other faculty ranks.

The Director appealed to the authorities of the State Services for assistance in whole or in part on some items which will aid academic activities and research development and which are to be named after the indefatigable DG-DSS.

In a goodwill message, a former Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. AbdulGaniyu Ambali, commended the DSS for its resourcefulness, dependability, and commitment to national security, saying that the Service was very instrumental to the peace enjoyed by the University during his tenure as Vice Chancellor.

### Why JAMB retains 16-year minimum age for admission - Oloyede

The Registrar said JAMB had initially considered preventing under 16 candidates from writing the UTME, but the Board observed that this could deny the exceptionally brilliant students among them the opportunities to prove their mettle. To address this, he said an indemnity process was introduced, which requires all underage candidates to formally declare their extraordinary academic abilities before being allowed to take the examination.

While analysing the performance of underage candidates over the past decade, the JAMB Registrar revealed that 70% of them failed to achieve their academic goals and many later expressed regret over their early entry into universities.

Prof. Oloyede, who is a former Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, also recounted an experience from his tenure as Vice-Chancellor of the University. He said, "There was a case where I had to plead with a student to complete his studies for his father's sake. The father wanted him to study Medicine, and he made it to 600 level. But just three months before his final exams, he refused to write them. Despite all efforts, he left, later enrolled at the University of Lagos, studied Mass Communication, and graduated with a First-Class."

The JAMB Registrar criticised parents who pressure their children into careers solely to boost their own status. "Some parents misdirect their children out of selfishness. They want to use them to decorate their CVs, by saying, 'I am the father of a doctor' or 'I am the father of a lawyer.' But they fail to consider what is best for the child", he lamented.

While sharing his impression of the UNILORIN CBT Centre accredited for registration of UTME and DE candidates and its compliance with laid-down rules, the JAMB Registrar said that the performance of the University of Ilorin UTME Registration Centre and other centres across the state has been excellent. He also took time to commend the CBT centres, the staff of JAMB, and the security agents participating in the exercise.

Prof. Oloyede, who

acknowledged a significant improvement from past challenges of inefficiencies and excuses eight years ago, attributed the efficiency of the process of the 2025 exercise to the dedication and competence of JAMB staff in upholding high standards. He equally credited security agencies for maintaining order, and highlighted the role of telecommunications companies whose cooperation, following clear instructions, has contributed to the success of the exercise so far.

The JAMB Registrar noted that CBT Centres have shown greater compliance with regulations and those found wanting have been punished appropriately.

Prof. Oloyede also announced that six centres were recently sanctioned for engaging in blank registrations, a practice linked to exam malpractice, and were suspended for a week as a corrective measure before being called for a meeting where they issued formal apologies. Although JAMB initially considered a two-week suspension, he said the Board opted for a shorter duration to prevent penalising innocent candidates who had registered with those centres.

To maintain integrity, he said JAMB has now identified and blacklisted specific individuals responsible for the infractions. Regardless of their future roles, even if they become lecturers or Vice Chancellors, Prof. Oloyede said they would remain permanently excluded from all JAMB-related activities.

Prof. Oloyede, however, used the opportunity provided by the monitoring tour to explain how the University of Ilorin emerged as the winner of the National Tertiary Admissions' Performance-Merit Award (NATAP-M Award) for the 2021/2022 and 2022/2023 academic sessions, saying that the most sought-after University in Nigeria met all requirements and complied with admission guidelines.

Meanwhile, the Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, has expressed optimism that the admission quota of the University for the 2025 Admission Exercise would increase, citing the numerous facilities and improvements put in place by the Institution. He noted that these developments have better positioned the University to accommodate a larger number of candidates.

Commenting on the ongoing UTME registration at the UNILORIN CBT Centre, Prof. Egbewole said that the process has been smooth and very orderly, stating that the system put in place by JAMB has significantly facilitated the process this year.

The Vice Chancellor praised the University's collaboration with JAMB and the seamless coordination of the registration process, which has made it easier for candidates to complete their registration without any major challenges.

### Narratives of women inferiority dangerous -- Amoloye-Adebayo

According to the Inaugural Lecturer, the inspiration for the title of the Lecture came from a 12-year old poser from her earlier lecture, entitled "Islamic Law for Men? Or for Everyone?The Dilemmatic Question of a Muslim Woman."

Describing Islamic Law as an "amalgamation of Shar'īah and Fiqh as both the divine and human component of the law", Prof. Amoloye-Adebayo drew a distinctive line between feminism and gender, which, according to her, "emerged in reaction to the theory of male dominance in life experiences."

The Inaugural Lecturer, who is the Head of the Department of Islamic Law, pointed out that the Judeo-Christian and Islamic origin of creation is biased to the extent of depicting the creation of woman as an after-thought, inferior or mere helpers to men, arguing that the woman is the other half of creation, the opposite of the man. She buttressed her view with quotation from the Holy Qur'an, "O People! reverence your Guardian-Lord, who created you from a single being and created from it, it's mate and spread from these two, many men and women" '(Q4:1; Q39:6).

While stressing the need for synergy between man's agency and woman's agency, Prof. Amoloye-Adebayo said that most contemporary interpretations of Islamic law is informed by colonial androcentrism.

She, therefore, called for equitable relations in matters of Islamic Law and private affairs between men and women, and Islamic Law and public affairs between men and women, concerning leadership, spiritual and temporal.

According to the first Professor of Islamic Law at the University of Ilorin, "The emphasis on equitable relations is the bedrock of regulations in Islamic Law, as provided in Q57:25 that: 'We sent

a foretime our messengers with clear signs and sent down with the Book and the Balance (of Right and Wrong), that human beings may conduct themselves with equity"

For women to grow out of unnecessary limiting factors to their self actualisation, Prof. Amoloye-Adebayo called on women to have the courage to pursue scholarship in Islamic Law, despite men's domination of

the field, so that they don't use their life experiences to validate the toga of women inferiority.

The Inaugural Lecturer, who is the first female Faculty member in the Department of Islamic Law, University of Ilorin, described herself as a Woman Agent in the study of Islamic Law, and expressed the concern that it could take such a long time to produce a female Professor in Islamic Law.

Prof. Amoloye-Adebayo, who is also a member of the Editorial Board of *UNILORIN Bulletin*, canvassed for the encouragement of the scholarship of Muslim women in Islamic Law, saying that women should be encouraged to exercise the courage needed in a male dominated area of Islamic Law.

She also called for the amendment of the provisions of the Child's Right Act, 2003 "to bring the Islamic law position on early marriage within its purview". According to her, "It is believed that if the idea of the best interest of the child is given more prominence than the prohibition of marriages of young persons under 18 for

early marriages, it will provide a religiously authentic basis for review of such marriages".

Prof. Amoloye-Adebayo who has so far supervised 300 undergraduate projects, 23 Master degree dissertations, has also graduated a Ph.D student. She has also served her Department, Faculty and the University Community on various standing and adhoc committees in the past two decades.

A researcher of international repute, the 274<sup>th</sup> Inaugural Lecturer had represented Africa in several world academic fora. In 2013, she presented a research on Transnational Judicial Dialogue at Pluricourts in Oslo, Norway and in 2019, she was also African Representative for Young Scholars Residential Fellowship Award in Law and Religion, International Centre for Law and Religion Studies (ICLRS), Proro, Utah.

The well attended Lecture was graced by Principal Officers of the University, senior academics and dignitaries from far and wide.

### VC urges ASALLIN to embrace technology with caution

he Vice Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, has advised members of the Academic Society for Arabic Language and Literature in Nigeria (ASALLIN) to exercise caution in adopting modern technology, particularly as it relates to teaching aids.

Prof. Egbewole gave this advice last Monday (February 10, 2025) in his remarks at the 19th International Conference organised by ASALLIN in collaboration with the Department of Arabic and Transnational Studies, University of Ilorin. The conference, held at the University Auditorium, was themed "Towards Modernising Arabic Curricula and the Use of Modern Teaching Aids."

Prof. Egbewole, who was also the Chief Host of the Conference, stressed the importance of leveraging technology to enhance learning while being mindful of its potential challenges.

He highlighted the need for fundamental regulations to guide technological advancements to benefit the society at large.

The Vice Chancellor also called on ASALLIN to collaborate with the University of Ilorin to reshape and reposition Arabic language scholars.

He welcomed participants from all 36 states of Nigeria to Ilorin, which he described as the "City of Arabic Language."

Prof. Egbewole urged ASALLIN members to continue their efforts in promoting Arabic language and literature in Nigeria.

In his keynote address, the Dean of the Faculty of Arts, Al-Isra University, Amman, Jordan, Prof. Hashim Salih Manna, stressed that modernisation is essential for Arabic language education.

He explained that Arabic, as a flexible language, has historically embraced influences from other languages without losing its originality and charm.



The Professor of Literature and Criticism stressed the importance of integrating Artificial Intelligence (AI), critical thinking skills, and advanced teaching methods into the Arabic curricula.

The Jordanian poet argued that modernisation is key to improving the quality of education and ensuring that Arabic remains relevant in today's world.

In his welcome address, the National President of ASALLIN, Prof. Ibrahim Abubakar Imam, reaffirmed that Arabic is a living language that continues to evolve alongside global civilisation.

He stated that ASALLIN is committed to developing innovative teaching methods to enhance Arabic education in Nigeria.

Prof. Imam also praised Ilorin for its rich academic heritage and thanked Prof. Egbewole for the hospitality extended to ASALLIN members during the Conference.

Also speaking at the event, the Chairman of the occasion, Prof. Shaykh Lukman Alade Jimoh, who is also the Vice Chancellor of the Kwara State University, Malete, described the 19th International Conference of ASALLIN as a milestone for the advancement of Arabic knowledge in Nigeria.

He noted that AI and modern

### **CPSS and the UNILORIN ideals**

ince its inception in 2008, and especially in recent times, the University of Ilorin Centre for Peace and Strategic Studies (CPSS) has been in the vanguards of the organs of the University promoting the ideals and values envisioned by the

founding fathers of the Better by far institution.

The Centre, established to train world-class manpower in the fields of peace, development, and strategic studies, is currently headed by the charismatic Professor of History and International Studies, its seventh Director, AbdulGaniyu Ibrahim Jawondo. It has done a great lot to expound the community service leg of the tripodal core mandates of the University while not neglecting the two other critical mandates of teaching and research. Before Jawondo, the Centre had been previously headed by Prof. Isaac Olawale Albert, Prof. Felicia Olabisi A. Olasehinde-Williams, Prof. Joseph Odekunle Fayeye, Prof. Mahfouz Adebola Adedimeji, Prof. Noah Yusuf, and Prof. Oyeronke Olademo.

More than any other Centre, the CPSS has facilitated the achievement of a seamless town and gown relationship, contributing immensely to the excellent image and fantastic

national reputation being enjoyed by the University.

Established under the visionary vice-chancellorship of Professor Emeritus Is'haq Oloyede, CON, the CPSS has relentlessly pushed the execution of the University's community service mandate in many ways, including public lecture series with their attendant impact on public policy formulation or/and redirection, initiation of several Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) with reputable governmental and nongovernmental agencies, contributing to the training and retraining of top military and para-military brass hats as well as other national security policy stakeholders in the public and private sectors.

One of the ways by which the Centre has been promoting the ideals of the University, especially the Vision 1: 10: 500 of the Prof. Wahab Egbewole Administration, is the hosting of periodic Public Lectures during which national issues, especially those bordering on internal security, are thoroughly dissected and practical suggestions proffered for seamless way-forward. In 2024, specifically on September 24, the CPSS Distinguished Public Lecture, titled "The Roles and Contributions of the Nigerian Army to National Development", was delivered by the late Chief of Army Staff, Lt. Gen. Taoreed Lagbaja, represented by the Chief of Training, Army, Maj. Gen. Sanni Mohammed. With those lectures, handled by eminent experts in various crucial sectors of the nation's polity, the Centre has immensely contributed to furthering national development, thereby putting an unmistakable stamp of credence on the well-acknowledged relevance of the University of Ilorin in national affairs.

Last week's Distinguished Personality Lecture organised by the Centre was in a class of its own. It was not one of your run-of-the-mill events. Not just a lecture "to fulfill all righteousness," neither was it "a lecture for lecture sake". It was an event whose conception, delivery, and impact touched on the very rubrics of the very ideals that UNILORIN, nay any university that is worth its salt, should normally espouse, i.e. the third leg of the university core mandates -- community service. Indeed, the Public Lecture series, organised by the CPSS, are to formulate new theories and practices in peace education for the general public.

Delivered by the Director-General of the Department of State Services (DSS), Mr Oluwatosin Adeola Ajayi, represented by Assistant Director-General of Intelligence, Mr. Patrick Ikenweiwe, the 2025 Distinguished Personality Lecture, was, indeed, a veritable security policy statement, which underscored

the need for massive stakeholders' support for the DSS in its concerted efforts to enhance national internal security.

In the lecture, titled "The Role of the DSS in Security, Peacekeeping, and National Integration", the DSS boss lamented the current perception of security and intelligence organisations as enemies rather than friends, saying that this must be addressed, as it affects the quality and quantity of intelligence shared, with its deleterious effects on peace building and national integration.

To address this and other challenges facing security agencies in the country, Mr Ajayi called for the re-orientation of the citizens on the roles of intelligence agencies and a review of their recruitment and staffing processes. He also urged stakeholders to increase their support for the DSS, particularly in terms of funding and valuing the intelligence outputs provided to them.

In his welcome address, the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Ilorin, Prof. Wahab Olasupo Egbewole, SAN, commended the Department of State Services (DSS) for its

significant contributions to national security.

The Director of the CPSS, Prof. Jawondo, fspsp, in his opening remarks, said that the Centre and the DSS have had longstanding and symbiotic relationship, adding that the Centre regularly admits and graduates DSS personnel and supports the National Institute for Security Studies, Abuja, through affiliation.

In a goodwill message, posted on a popular and authoritative UNILORIN WhatsApp group platform, the Director of the Centre for Ilorin Studies (CILS), another University organ for promoting town and gown relationship, Prof. Issa Olarongbe Sanusi, said, "I congratulate our amiable Vice Chancellor for being receptive to programmes that project the good image of the University. Today's programme is like holding forth for the Federal Government on crucial national issues bothering on security and peaceful coexistence. Kudos to our dynamic Director, Prof. Jawondo, for his effective mobilisation strategies."

The Centre for Peace and Strategic Studies initiated its Annual Distinguished Personality Lecture on its 10th anniversary in 2018. The maiden edition was delivered by Prof. Yusuf Olaolu Ali, SAN, in April 2018, and he discussed "Opportunities, Challenges, and Prospects of Peace Scholars in a Conflict-ridden Environment." The second edition was delivered by Prof. Matt Meyer, the then Secretary General, Institute for Peace Research, on April 9th, 2019. The topic of his lecture was "International Trends in Peace Action and Peace Research: South to North and into the Future."

The 5th CPSS Biennial International Conference was held between 5th and 7th November, 2017, and the lead paper was presented by Engr Mustapha Yunusa Maihaja, the then Director General of the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA). The 6th CPSS Biennial International Conference was held between 6th and 9th November, 2019 with the lead paper presented by the late Governor Rotimi Akeredolu of Ondo State, who discussed "Domesticating Sustainable Development Goal 16 in Nigeria: Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions."

The Olomu of Omu-Aran, Oba Abdulraheem Oladele Adeoti, was the Royal Guest Lecturer at the CPSS on 17th December, 2019. The royal father spoke on "The Roles of Traditional Institution in Promoting Peace and Development in

Nigeria.'
